

Here are some crucial numbers you should always keep close:

For Emergencies only

Ø In case of immediate danger, criminal activity, or medical emergencies, dial 911.

Non-Emergency Police Line

Ø Please call 416-808-2222.
Ø You can also report to the police anonymously through their website, www.222tips.com.
Ø Call 416-222-TIPS (8477)
Ø Text TOR and message CRIMES (274637) or on the "Leave a Tip" Facebook page.

Stolen SIN number or Wallet

Ø Please call 800 465 7166 or Search for "What to do if you suspect your SIN is compromised" with the link: <u>https://www.canada.ca/en/employment-</u> <u>social-</u> <u>development/services/sin/reports/code-</u> <u>of-practice.html#h2.10</u>.

Family and Trusted Contacts

Ø Maintain a list of family members or friends you can call in an emergency.
Ø Share your whereabouts and concerns with them regularly.

Bank and Financial Institutions

Ø If you suspect fraudulent financial activities, immediately contact your bank to protect your assets.

Having these numbers readily available allows you to take action and seek help when needed. We encourage you to share this information with fellow seniors to help create a safer and more secure environment for all.
